

Agreement Among Pairs of Justices

The following tables show the percentage of decisions in which every possible pair of justices found themselves on the same side—either both in the majority or both dissenting. The first table covers all 134 decisions; the second table narrows its focus to decisions that were not unanimous. When reading the first table, for instance, one finds that Justices Abrahamson and Callow voted together in 85% of the decisions, while the figure for Justices Day and Beilfuss was 97%.
